



2019 ENROLMENT INFORMATION

HERE are the key dates and information you need to enrol for next year:

Monday 19 November – See 2019 Courses

You will be able to view our 2019 courses online at our website www.u3anunawading.com.au or by picking up a 2019 Course Guide at the U3A Nunawading Silver Grove office.

Friday 23 November – End of Term 4

Monday 26 November – Re-enrol & Choose up to 3 Classes

From 9am you can choose to re-enrol online via our website or do it in person by coming into the Silver Grove office. Initially, you can choose up to three classes, not including Computer Classes, Summer School or Volunteering.

PLEASE NOTE:

Restricted Classes: *Some classes are restricted due to high demand so you will only be able to enrol in one **Restricted** class within a particular course group. These classes are marked with an **R** in the course code. You can enrol in more than one Restricted Class as long as they are for different types of classes (i.e. different Course Codes).*

Classes that show a Maximum Enrolment of One:

If you enrol in a class that shows a class maximum enrolment as '1', you will be waitlisted initially because Leaders of these classes have indicated that a certain skill level is required. You will be advised by email if you have been accepted.

Enrolling Online: Please see page 4 for an easy guide to re-enrolling online. *If you would like the convenience of re-enrolling online from home, but aren't sure how to do it, come into the office any time before 26 November and a Committee Member on duty will show you how.*

Enrolling at the Office: If you wish to re-enrol in

person, the office will be open from 9am – 3.30pm from Monday 26 November – Wednesday 5 December. Volunteers will be on hand to process your re-enrolment and payment. You will need to complete a 2019 Re-enrolment Form before you see one of our volunteers. These will be posted to members without email addresses and available in the office and on our website from Monday 19 November.

Payment of Fees: The membership fee for 2019 is \$75. You can pay at the office by EFTPOS (our preferred method), cheque made out to U3A Nunawading Inc., or by cash, in which case correct money would be appreciated.

Tuesday 27 November – Enrolment of New Members

As it takes much longer to enrol a new member than to re-enrol an existing member, this year we will not be doing any enrolments for new members on 26 November. This will enable us to spend more time with new members explaining how we operate and helping them to choose suitable courses. If you have friends who are interested in joining, please advise them of this date, but remember, new members can enrol online from 26 November.

Wednesday 5 December – Office Closes

From this date you will not be able to come into the office to re-enrol or pay. The office will reopen for the six days of Summer School on 8, 9, 10, and 15, 16, 17 January.

Friday 7 December – 3 Class Limit Lifted

After this date you can go online and enrol in additional classes. If you are interested in classes which do not commence until later in the year and wish to enrol in more than three classes, it is suggested you do not enrol in any class that starts after Term 1 until after this date.

Some members do not have access to a computer or iPad so do not use email and we will continue to do our best to call these members when a class is cancelled.

Community Hub

As many of you will be aware by now, Whitehorse Council has appointed Ireland Brown Constructions to build the Nunawading

Community Hub on the site of the old Nunawading Primary School in Springvale Road. By the time you read this newsletter, the builders should have established a presence on the site.

In a letter to all stakeholders including U3A Nunawading, Council advised that construction is expected to take place from late 2018 to early 2020. Therefore, we plan to commence Term 1 in 2020 at our existing premises and move to the new Community Hub some months later.

We have established a Transition to the Hub sub-committee with Andrew Gee as Convenor and we will keep you advised about progress as information becomes available.

5 EASY STEPS FOR RE-ENROLLING ONLINE

RE-ENROLMENT for current U3A Nunawading members opens on **Monday 26 November** at 9am. Following is an easy guide to re-enrolling online. If you get stuck along the way, simply call the office on 9878 3898 and someone will help you complete your enrolment.

1. Log into your U3A record:

Go to our website www.u3anunawading.com.au. On the right-hand side of the blue band above picture gallery click on **Click here for Member enrolments**. Log in using your member number or email address and password. Your password is the last four digits of your phone number unless you have changed it. From mid-February 2018 members who enrolled at the office were given a five digit password based on the last five digits of their phone number.

2. Select your Courses:

Click on **View or select Courses**. Initially you can only select **THREE** courses. This gives all members a better chance of being accepted into at least one course of their choice. The three class limit will be removed after 7 December so you can go online again and make further selections. Once you have ticked your course/s, click **Confirm Selection** to register your choices.

- **Three Class Limit** does not include Computer classes, Summer School and Volunteering.
- **Restricted Classes:** Some classes are restricted due high demand so you can only enrol in one **Restricted** class within a particular course group. These classes have an **R** in their course code. You can enrol in more than one Restricted Class as long as they are different types of classes.
- **Maximum of One Classes:** If you enrol in a class that shows maximum enrolment as '1', you will be waitlisted initially because Leaders of these classes have indicated that a certain skill level is required. You will be advised by email if you have been accepted.

3. Complete your re-enrolment:

On this page you will see the classes you have chosen and whether you have been accepted immediately or waitlisted. Please check that you have selected the right classes. Tick **Agree to Terms and Conditions** then click **Finalise Courses**.

4. Payment:

You can pay using PayPal either with your PayPal account or credit card. If you do not wish to pay online, print two copies of your invoice and bring them to the Silver Grove office. At the bottom of the **Member Details** page next to the amount due you will find a blue button – click on this to pay online, or print your invoice. If you wish to pay at the office please do so after 26 November as the first day of enrolment is very busy. The office will be open for enrolment and receiving payment until Wednesday 5 December and again during Summer School on 8, 9 and 10, and 15, 16 and 17 January.

5. Check your details:

Finally, before logging out, check you contact details and, if you need to make a change, go to **Edit Member Details**. Don't forget to **SAVE** after making any alteration.

A TRIBUTE TO ZOLTAN

ZOLTAN Bardos was born on 6 October 1938, in Transylvania – onetime home to infamous Ruler, “Vlad the Impaler”, also mentioned in Bram Stoker’s book “Dracula”.

‘Zoltan’ translates as Sultan or Ruler and rumour has it that he is descended from Zoltan, son of Grand Prince Arpad – head of the Hungarian Tribal Federation during the conquest of the Carpathian Basin (c.895). Also referred to as the Turul Dynasty, the name stems from the magical Turul Bird Legend, monuments to which are found throughout Hungary. This may explain some of Zoltan’s characteristics and traits!

In 1940, Zoltan’s father moved the family to Hungary to escape persecution of Hungarians after the Versailles Treaty partitioned Hungary. During World War II they lived 23kms north of Budapest where their pet goat Mitzi kept the family alive with her milk and kids. Zoltan tells of rescuing Mitzi from the path of a swooping German fighter plane.

His grandparents stayed in Romania and after the war, as they were better off, his grandmother crossed the border taking Zoltan and his brother back to their birthplace Temesvar – currently called Timisoara – where they started school. Temesvar had the first electric street lights in Europe.

During the turbulent times leading up to the 1956 Hungarian Revolution Zoltan, aged 18, made his third illegal border crossing fleeing the country with five other young men. Exhausted and hungry after walking 50kms on a freezing night, they slept in a farmer’s barn before evading border guards and crossing into Austria. All six stayed in an Austrian migrant camp for 12 months before emigrating to various counties. Zoltan boarded a ship to Australia, arriving in January 1958. He soon joined a Vespa Scooter Club – very popular in the 1950s – and travelled Victoria and interstate.

At that club he met his future wife, the lovely Margaret: she from

Scotland and Zoltan from Hungary. An interesting mix but one that was built to last. Margaret told us the story of when Zoltan first introduced himself to club members; in true Aussie style they said “that’s no good, we’ll call you Bill”, thus Margaret got to know him as “Bill”.

Zoltan and Margaret settled down and had twin boys, Robert and David, who now live in Sydney and Hobart. They also have two grandchildren, Timothy and Melissa.

Zoltan spent most of his working life with the Victorian Railways. He and Margaret have made the most of their opportunities in retirement and have travelled to many countries and are planning to do more. They both joined U3A to broaden their horizons and for many years Zoltan was a U3A Leader of Walking Group 1 and Assistant Leader of Walking Group 2; he is also a member of other U3A classes.


We congratulate him on joining the Magical “OBE” (Over Bloody Eighty) Club and wish him and Margaret many happy years to come.

from Venice to Rome

YOU approach Venice by train from Florence through tunnels. The Italians are very skilled at tunnelling and concrete work. The train runs out of land about one kilometre from Venice and the last part runs on a pier. You come out on the railway station steps to the water's edge, where porters seek your custom; their trolleys, water taxi drivers, *vaporetti* (canal trams), gondolas and hundreds of people with suitcases form a noisy gaggle.

Our water taxi was a speedboat which headed for open water. After a rather rough ride, we entered a watery side street, barely fitting under the curved footbridge. Our Salute Palace Hotel, a footpath's width off the water's edge, was a welcoming 19th century baroque hotel. The chairs, bed, dressing table were all curved and padded.

The highlight was our visit to the Guggenheim Museum, a short walk along the canal and over a curved bridge. The bequest of Peggy Guggenheim, a jazz age American millionairess, it houses the world's best collection of 20th century modern masters – Picasso, Modigliani, Braques, Salvador Dali, etc. Peggy gifted her waterside house and all her collection to Venice.

Leaving Venice for Rome, we travelled by *vaporetto* two stops up the Grand Canal to the Santa Lucia train station where we took a two-hour City Sightseeing Tour. We passed several ancient ruins including the Colosseum and Circus Maximus where chariot races were held around the 530-metre perimeter track in the 1st and 2nd centuries.

When we visited the famous Trevi Fountain, the small piazza was a mass of tourists all trying to take "selfies" with the decorative marble mystical figures, wild horses and cascading rock falls, enclosed within a wide two foot high wall. It takes up an entire side of the 17th century Palazzo Poli, with jets of water spouting everywhere. This fountain, completed in 1762, is Rome's largest and most famous. Water is supplied by a 2000-year-old aqueduct that connects Rome to natural springs which are 19 km away.

Ironically, both Venice and Rome owe much of their touristic attraction to the ancient Goths. The residents of northern Italy were so harassed by the invading Visigoths, Huns and Vandals

that they decamped and took refuge on the muddy islands of the northern Adriatic, including Venezia, Murano and Burano. Ingeniously they reclaimed them with piles, piers and slabs of stone to support permanent cities.

At a later stage other anti-Christians, the Iconoclasts, took offence at the works of art of religions not their own and knocked the heads and hands off all the statues they came across. Modern Rome values ancient art, headless or not. It fills the coffers from tourism.


and Butterfingers Shortbread factory in Lilydale.

From Dome to Dungeon at the State Library

A group of 19 U3A Nunawading members enjoyed a guided tour of the Victorian State Library during the September holidays. The excursion had been part of the January Summer School, but due to the lack of a volunteer guide and refurbishment works, our tour had to be postponed.

During the hour and a half we travelled up to the Dome viewing balcony and down to the basement storage areas where we were shown rare books and a room where the old catalogue cards are stored. Apparently, most libraries disposed of their old cards once everything had been computerised.

The library, which was established on the site in Swanston Street in 1856, is made up of 23 individual buildings over a two-acre allotment and was originally called the Melbourne Public Library. This site is also the birthplace

of Melbourne's first Exhibition Buildings, the National Gallery and the Melbourne Museum.

We had an excellent guide who was very generous with her time but, due to the enormous size of the library, we could not visit every room. However, one area that was surprisingly large and very popular was the family history section. We are so lucky to have such a wonderful library at the heart of Marvellous Melbourne.

For anyone who would like to visit the library there are free daily tours and a wide range of exhibitions and events, with something for everyone.

Thank you to Elaine Forde for organising the tour. Unfortunately, Elaine was recovering from surgery and unable to join the group.
